Ash Street

The Ash Street houses were built by Six Companies in 1931 when the construction of Hoover Dam began. The Los Angeles Department of Water and Power acquired the houses in 1936 and maintained them until they were sold to the public at auction in 1986.

Historical Features

- Red shingle roofs
- Inset screened porches
- Two pane double-hung windows
- Sun rooms
- Grassy lawns



Birch Street

The Birch Street houses were built by the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power in 1937. These homes feature three basic floor plans with recessed entry porches and beautiful Spanish tile roofs.

Historical Features

- Red barrel tile roofs
- Stucco exterior walls
- Four pane double-hung windows
- Screen doors
- Grassy lawns



Cherry Street

The Cherry Street houses were built by the Southern California Edison Company starting in 1939 and finishing in 1945. There are four basic floor plans that feature double-hung windows and an entry porch.

Historical Features

- Red shingle roofs
- Twelve pane double-hung windows
- Concrete walkways
- Grassy lawns
