WELCOME LETTER FROM THE CITY CLERK

Dear Prospective Candidate,

Congratulations on your decision to seek election to the Boulder City Council.

The Mayor's seat and two City Council seats are up for election in 2026. These offices are non-partisan in nature, and all members of the City Council serve Boulder City residents at-large. The terms are for four years, November 2026 to November 2030.

Candidate filing is open to all eligible candidates. The filing period begins on Monday, March 2, 2026 at 8:00 a.m. in the City Clerk's office at 401 California Avenue, Boulder City, Nevada, and will end at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, March 13, 2026. The filing fee is \$25.00.

A Primary Election will be held if more than double the number of candidates file for an office. City Council seats are not distinguished individually, so if five or more candidates file for the position of Council member or three or more candidates file for the position of Mayor, a Primary Election will be conducted.

The candidates for Council member who receive the highest number of votes in the Primary Election will proceed to the General Election. However, if in the Primary Election, a candidate receives votes equal to the majority of voters casting ballots in that election, the candidate shall be considered elected to one of the vacancies, and their name shall not be placed on the ballot for the General Election.

All successful candidates will be inducted into office at the December 8, 2026, regular meeting of the City Council and will be seated at that meeting.

About Boulder City

The City of Boulder City is located just southeast of the Las Vegas Valley and has a population of approximately 15,000 residents. The City was settled in 1931 as a federal reservation to house the workers for the Hoover Dam project, and later formally incorporated on October 1, 1959 as a special charter City. The City operates under a Council-Manager form of government. The City Council is comprised of five members, a Mayor and four city council members elected at-large that serve four-year terms.

Mayor and Council Members

The Mayor and four City Council members are nonpartisan offices elected at large. The Mayor serves as a member of the City Council and presides over its meetings. The Mayor has no administrative duties in the City, but is recognized as the head of the City government for all ceremonial purposes and for dealing with emergencies if the State or Federal Government imposes martial law on the city. A Mayor pro tem is appointed by members of the City Council each year and performs the duties of the Mayor during the Mayor's absence.

The City Council, including the Mayor, is the governing body of the City and exercises legislative power by enacting ordinances, resolutions, orders, and other policies necessary for the management and execution of the powers vested in the City through the City Charter. The Mayor and City Council take action on all land use issues, expenditures of city funds, city ordinances, and various matters as set forth in the City Charter.

Members of the City Council also serve on various regional boards - Las Vegas Global Economic Alliance, Las Vegas Convention and Visitors Authority, Regional Transportation Commission, Regional Flood Control, District Board of Health, Southern Nevada Water Authority, Insurance Pool/Pact, Nevada League of Cities, Clark County Debt Management Commission, Southern Nevada Council of Governments and Workforce Connections LED Board.



City Charter

City Charter Section 96. Conduct of Municipal Elections

1. All municipal elections must be nonpartisan in character and must be conducted in accordance with:
 - (a) The provisions of [NRS 293.5772](#) to [293.5887](#), inclusive, which supersede and preempt any conflicting provisions of this Charter;
 - (b) All other provisions of the general election laws of this State, so far as those laws can be made applicable and are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Charter; and
 - (c) Any ordinance regulations as adopted by the City Council which are consistent with law and this Charter. (1959 Charter)
2. On the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 2022, and at each successive interval of 4 years, there must be elected by the qualified voters of the City, at a general municipal election to be held for that purpose, a Mayor and two Council Members who shall hold office for a period of 4 years and until their successors have been elected and qualified.
3. On the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 2024, and at each successive interval of 4 years, there must be elected by the qualified voters of the City, at a general municipal election to be held for that purpose, two Council Members who shall hold office for a period of 4 years and until their successors have been elected and qualified.
4. All full terms of office in the City Council are 4 years, and Council Members must be elected at large without regard to precinct residency. In each election, the candidates receiving the greatest number of votes must be declared elected to the available full-term positions. (Add. 17; Amd. 1; 11-5-1996)
5. In the event one or more 2-year term positions on the Council will be available at the time of a general municipal election as provided in section 12, candidates must file specifically for such position(s). Candidates receiving the greatest respective number of votes must be declared elected to the respective available 2-year positions. (Add. 15; Amd. 2; 6-4-1991)
6. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 7, a primary municipal election must be held:
 - (a) On the first Tuesday after the first Monday in April 2019; and
 - (b) Beginning in 2022, on the second Tuesday in June of each even-numbered year.
7. A primary municipal election must not be held if no more than double the number of Council Members to be elected file as candidates. A primary municipal election must not be held for the office of Mayor if no more than two candidates file for that position. The primary municipal election must be held for the purpose of eliminating candidates in excess of a figure double the number of Council Members to be elected. (Add. 17; Amd. 1; 11-5-1996)
8. If, in the primary municipal election, a candidate receives votes equal to a majority of voters casting ballots in that election, he or she shall be considered elected to one of the vacancies and his or her name shall not be placed on the ballot for the general municipal election. (Add. 10; Amd. 7; 6-2-1981)
9. In each primary and general municipal election, voters are entitled to cast ballots for candidates in a number equal to the number of seats to be filled in the municipal elections. (Add. 11; Amd. 5; 6-7-1983)
10. The conduct of all municipal elections must be under the control of the City Council, which shall adopt by ordinance all regulations which it considers desirable and consistent with law and this Charter. Nothing in this Charter shall be construed as to deny or abridge the power of the City Council to provide for supplemental regulations for the prevention of fraud in such elections and for the recount of ballots in cases of doubt or fraud.

(Add. 30, Amd. 1, 2015; Leg. Sess. 10-19-2019, eff. 7-1-2021)

Declaring Candidacy

Offices up for Election/Qualifications:

Mayor and City Council Member (2 Seats)

Qualifications for candidates are established in the Boulder City Charter, Section 5 as follows:

- No person shall be eligible for the office of Council member or Mayor unless he is a qualified elector of Boulder City and has been a resident of the City for at least 2 years immediately prior to the election in which he is a candidate.
- He shall hold no other elective public office, but he may hold a commission as a notary public or be a member of the Armed Forces reserve.
- No employee of the City or officer thereof, excluding City Council members, receiving compensation under the provisions of this Charter or any City ordinance, shall be a candidate for or eligible for the office of Council member or Mayor without first resigning from City employment or City office.
- If a Council member or the Mayor ceases to possess any of the qualifications or is convicted of a felony, or ceases to be a resident of the City, his office shall immediately become vacant.

Candidate Filing Period March 2, 2026—March 13, 2026

Filing period begins Monday, March 2, 2026 , 8:00 a.m. and closes Friday, March 13, 2026, 5:00 p.m. (Fridays by appointment; excluding Saturday, and Sunday)

Candidates will begin the filing process by creating an account and completing required forms using [AURORA Candidate Filing system](#) on the Nevada Secretary of State's website.

Once the electronic forms have been submitted, candidates will visit the City Clerk's Office located at 401 California Ave, Boulder City, and provide the following:

- 1) a valid driver's license or identification card issued by a governmental agency that contains a photograph of the candidate and the candidate's residential address [NRS 293C.185](#); or
- 2) a current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, or document issued by a governmental entity, including a check which indicates the candidate's name and residential address, but not including a voter registration card issued pursuant to [NRS 293.517](#).
- 3) pay a \$25 filing fee (personal checks not allowed [NRS 293.193](#))

The above proof of identity shall be copied and retained by the filing officer and may not be withheld from the public and must not contain the social security number, driver's license or identification card number, or account number of the candidate.

Salary & Benefits

The Council is paid once per month. The annual salary amount is \$20,000.00 per year for Council and \$26,000.00 per year for Mayor. Council members may also be eligible for Nevada's Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS); however, this benefit applies only to those who meet the eligibility requirements.

Candidate Ballot Name

Name Requirements:

Candidates' names will appear in surname alphabetical order by office on the ballot. Partisan offices will have an indication of each candidate's party or "no political party" (NPP), as applicable. All non-partisan offices will have NP (nonpartisan) after the name of each candidate ([NRS 293.256](#), [293.2565](#), [293.263](#), [293.265](#), and [293.267](#)).

Names must meet legal requirements for the use of given names, surnames and nicknames:

- **Professional/Occupational References:** Titles, designations or other references indicating a candidate's profession or occupation are not allowed ([NRS 293.256](#));
- **Given Names and Surnames:** Candidates' names may be their given name and surname or a contraction or familiar form of their given name followed by their surname ([NRS 293.2565\(1\)](#));
- **Nicknames:** The use of a nickname in conjunction with the candidate's legal name is allowed, and the nickname may be printed on the official ballots in accordance with the provisions. A nickname of not more than 10 letters may be incorporated into the name of a candidate. The nickname must be in quotation marks and appear immediately before the surname of the candidate. A nickname must not indicate any political, economic, social or religious view or affiliation and must not be the name of any person, living or dead, whose reputation is known on a statewide, nationwide or worldwide basis, or in any other manner deceive a voter regarding the person or principles for which he or she is voting.



Campaign Finance Reporting

Filing Requirements for Candidates

State law requires that all Contributions & Expense (C&E) Reports and Financial Disclosure Statements be filed electronically with the Secretary of State's office using the [AURORA, Campaign Finance Disclosure](#) system.

Every person who files for candidacy is required to file **all four (4) Contributions & Expenses Reports (C&E) as required by NRS Chapter [294A.350](#) even if:**

- (a) Withdraws his or her candidacy pursuant to [293C.195](#);
- (b) Ends his or her campaign without withdrawing his or her candidacy pursuant to [293C.195](#);
- (c) Receives no contributions;
- (d) Has no campaign expenses;
- (e) Is not opposed in the election by another candidate;
- (f) Is defeated in the primary or general election; (g) Is removed from the ballot by court order.

The candidate Financial Disclosure Statement (FDS) is due not later than ten (10) days after the end of candidate filing and covers the preceding calendar year plus January 1 of the current year through the last date of candidate filing (NRS 281.561(1)(a)). All candidates seeking public office who are entitled to receive \$6,000 or more annually must file the Candidate FDS by March 23, 2026

Penalty fees (NRS 294A.420(3))

- If the report is filed 1-7 days late, \$25 for each day the report is late.
- If the report is filed 8-15 days late, \$50 for each day the report is late.
- If the report is filed more than 15 days late, \$100 for each day the report is late, up to a maximum of \$10,000 for each violation.

Campaign Signs

Boulder City Code, Chapter 11-24 Sign and Advertising Structures

11-24-5 - BASIC POLICIES:

The policies and principles stated in this section apply to all signs within the regulatory scope of this chapter, and to all procedures set forth in, or invoked by, this chapter. These policies are to prevail over any other provision to the contrary, even if more specific.

.....

E. Substitution Of Messages. Subject to the property owner's consent, a noncommercial message of any type may be substituted for any duly permitted or allowed commercial message or any duly permitted or allowed noncommercial message, provided that the sign structure or mounting device is legal without consideration of message content. Such substitution of message may be made without any additional approval or permitting. This provision prevails over any more specific provision to the contrary within this chapter. The purpose of this provision is to prevent any inadvertent favoring of commercial speech over noncommercial speech, or favoring of any particular noncommercial message over any other noncommercial message. This provision does not create a right to increase the total amount of signage on a parcel, lot or use; does not affect the requirement that a sign structure or mounting device be properly permitted; and does not allow the substitution of an off site commercial message in place of an on site commercial message.

.....

J. Property Owner's Consent. No sign may be displayed without the consent of the legal owner(s) of the property on which the sign is mounted or displayed. For purposes of this policy, "owner" means the holder of the legal title to the property and all parties and persons holding a present right to possession, control or use of the property.



Campaign Signs Continued

11-24-9 Signs not Subject to Permit Requirements:

In addition to the signage rights and rules which are defined by zone, the following signs are allowed in any zone, without a permit, subject to the conditions stated:

C. Noncommercial Messages. Signs displaying noncommercial messages, such as (by way of example, and not limitation), opinions on matters of religion, politics, social policy, etc., may be displayed at any time and in any zone, subject to:

1. Commercial and Industrial Zones. In commercial and industrial zones, as allowed under the message substitution policy.
2. Residential Zones. In residential zones, per residential unit, at all times:

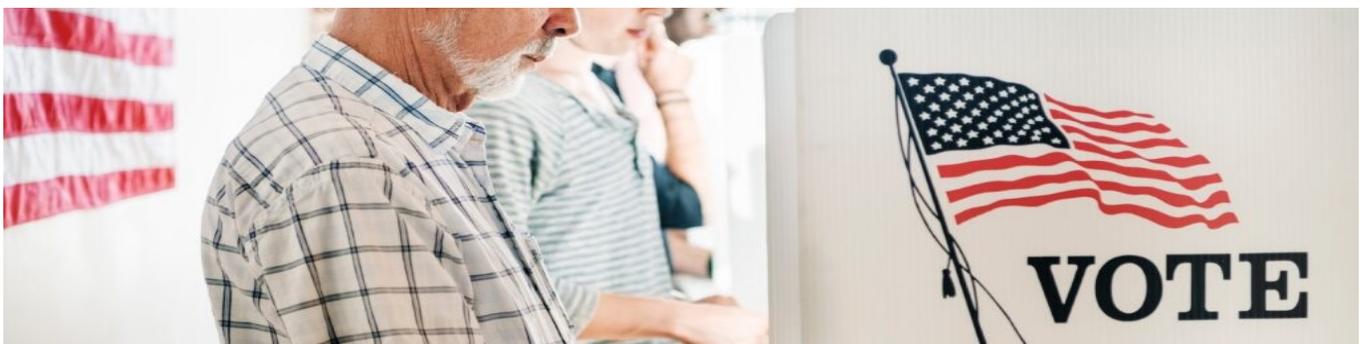
Maximum area	6 square feet per sign
Maximum height (if freestanding)	4 feet
Illumination	Not allowed
If the sign structure is permanent in physical nature, then all applicable building and safety code requirements shall be met.	

3. Temporary Increase In Noncommercial Message Signs Area. During the period beginning sixty (60) days before any primary, special or general election, and ending five (5) days thereafter, the amount of sign area used for noncommercial speech messages may be increased as follows:

- a. In commercial and industrial zones: An additional eighteen (18) square feet of sign area;
- b. In residential zones: An additional fourteen (14) square feet of sign area per sign.

PLEASE NOTE:

No political signs can be placed within state highway rights-of-way.



Electioneering/Campaigning

Electioneering Restrictions [\(NRS 293.361\)](#)

Electioneering is prohibited within 100 feet from the entrance to the building or structure in which a polling place for early voting is open for voting. Electioneering is defined as campaigning for or against a candidate, ballot question, or political party by:

- Posting signs supporting or opposing a candidate, ballot question, or political party.
- Distribution of literature relating to the support of or opposition to a candidate, ballot question, or political party.
- Using loudspeakers to broadcast information relating to the support of or opposition to a candidate, ballot question, or political party.
- Buying, selling, wearing, or displaying any badge, button, or other insignia that expressly refers to any political party or a candidate or ballot question to be voted upon in the current election, except that a person may wear political insignia while voting only if reasonably unable to cover or remove it (but that person must vote and leave as expediently as possible)
- Soliciting signatures to any kind of petition.

Electioneering/Campaigning Protocol

at City of Boulder City Facilities

There is no statutory language that prohibits the distribution of election campaign handouts prior to Election Day, except during the time a polling place is open for early voting.

The Parks and Recreation gym will be utilized for early voting, so displaying of political signs or campaign buttons, distributing campaign brochures, advocating for a candidate or any other related actions cannot occur within one hundred (100) feet from the entrance to the voting area.



Candidate Communications and Social Media/

Use of City Facilities

Candidate Communications and Social Media:

All communication by candidates with members of the Boulder City Council and City staff using email, text messages, and/or social media platforms is subject to applicable provisions of the Nevada Public Records Act and the Nevada Open Meeting Law on all personal and City-issued devices.

Use of the City of Boulder City brand marks (logos) by third parties must be requested through the Communication Department and is subject to review and approval. The Communications Department is responsible for governing the City's brand and maintaining the City's brand standards.

Use of City Facilities:

A Special Event Permit is required and can be obtained online through the registration system or in person at the Boulder City Parks and Recreation Office. Boulder City requires a certificate of insurance naming the City of Boulder City as additionally insured.

\$100 refundable deposit (returned if no damage or debris).

No use fee charged for Boulder City Residents.

Boulder City Code, Chapter 7-5-6 USE BY ORGANIZED GROUPS:

A. Special Events License And Special Use Permit. Any person, company, association, organization or group desiring to use any facility or area of a public park for a particular purpose such as a picnic, party, celebration, services, exercise or any other activity must obtain a special events license and/or special use permit and comply with the requirements therefor as provided in this Code and applicable regulations of the Parks and Recreation Department.

Early Voting Procedures

Before you are allowed to vote, an election official will verify your eligibility and signature using a computer connected to the Election Department's centralized voter registration files. Your voter record will be updated immediately as part of your processing, thus preventing the possibility of an individual voting twice. Early voting results are reported after 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

Same Day Voter Registration

Same day voter registration, including updates to existing registration, is available for those who miss the Standard Registration deadline.

- Must vote in-person (vote by mail)
- Must have a current and valid Nevada ID and proof of Clark County residency

Mail-In/Absentee Voting

All Boulder City voters who are registered to vote no later than 14 days before Election Day will automatically receive a mail ballot whether or not they requested one, unless they opted-out.

Opt-Out

To opt-out, a voter must submit a written or online Mail Ballot Preference Form as notification that they do not want a mail ballot. A printable form is available on the Clark County Election Department's website at www.ClarkCountyNV.gov/vote

Mail Ballot Delivery

Delivery of mail ballots will begin no later than 20 days before early voting.

Mail Ballot Drop Off Boxes

Secure, locked mail ballot drop boxes will be at all early voting and Election Day voting sites and the Boulder City, City Clerk's Office. A voter may deposit their mail ballot in a drop box instead of sending it through the mail.

In-Person Voting

A voter may vote in-person instead of by mail, to do so they will need to do one of the following:

- Surrender their mail ballot at a designated voting site (preferably in the packet sent)
- If a voter does not have their mail ballot, they will be required to sign an affirmation at the voting site swearing that they have not already voted in the current election

Mail Ballot Deadlines

Voted mail ballots returned through the post office **must** be postmarked no later than Election Day.

All voted mail ballots returned through the post office **must** be received by the Election Department by **5:00 p.m.** on June 13, 2026 for the Primary Election and November 7, 2026 for the General Election.

Curing Mail Ballots

The deadline for curing mail ballot signature issues is **5:00 p.m.** on June 15, 2026 for the Primary Election and November 9, 2026 for the General Election.

Mail-In/Absentee Voting Continued

Tips for Mail Ballot Voting

- **Only put your own ballot in your own return envelope.** If more ballots than your own are in the envelope when returned, none of the ballots will be counted.
- **Sign the outside of the return envelope.**
- **Clearly mark the ballot per the instructions.** **DO NOT** sign the actual ballot.
- **Return the voted ballot as soon as possible.** Mail it as soon as possible or deposit it at one of the drop-off sites.



General Information

At-Large Voting

All candidates running for elective office shall be voted upon by the registered voters of the city at large. Every person who resides within the city at the time of holding any municipal election, and whose name appears upon the official register of voters in and for the city is entitled to vote at each municipal election for all offices to be voted for, and on all questions that may be submitted.

Candidates Receiving Votes Equal to a Majority of Voters Casting Ballots in the Primary Election

If, in the primary municipal election, a candidate receives votes equal to a majority of voters casting ballots in that election, he or she shall be considered elected to one of the vacancies and his or her name shall not be placed on the ballot for the general municipal election.

Candidates ~ General Election Ballot

If in the Primary Election no candidate receives a majority of voters casting ballots in that election for the office for which he is a candidate, the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes for each seat shall be placed on the ballot for the General Election.

Election Night

After the polls close at 7:00 p.m. on Election Day, the results are delivered to the Clark County Election Center central tabulation facility for processing. They are tabulated along with early voting and mail ballot results. The Boulder City, City Clerk remains on site observing this process. Internet access to unofficial election results is available after 7:00 p.m. The results are updated approximately every 20 minutes. A link to election results can be found at clarkcountynv.gov.

Election Canvass

Per NRS 293C.387 the City Council must canvass the returns and approve the official abstract of votes on or before the 10th day following the election.
