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## Boulder City Leaders Support Initiative for Ending Homelessness

**BOULDER CITY** – Estimates on the number of people experiencing homelessness in Boulder City range, but indications are that in the past year the population has increased. Tuesday night, Boulder City Council approved a measure entering into an interlocal agreement with Clark County, Las Vegas, North Las Vegas, and Henderson for shared funding of a Homeless Census and Evaluation, for the Homeless Management System, and for the Inclement Weather Shelter.

Local jurisdictions of the Southern Nevada Regional Planning Coalition formed a regional partnership to address homelessness. The purpose of the Southern Nevada Homelessness Continuum of Care Board – the SNH CoC Board (*previously known as the Committee on Homelessness*) - is to better track available services for the homeless population and to ensure that appropriate shelter is available during inclement weather (summer and winter) for those persons experiencing homelessness who desire help. Julie Calloway with Boulder City Parks and Recreation is a member of the Board. The program also participates in the counting of homeless persons (the Homeless Census and Evaluation) and other tasks necessary to ensure receipt of grants and other federal aid to assist this at-risk population.

“Boulder City has been blessed with generous residents and resources such as Emergency Aid, but as we see more people in need, it gets more difficult to help everyone,” said Mayor Rod Woodbury. “Working with regional partners, including taking advantage of the SNH CoC Board’s resources, enables us to tackle homelessness as a team and accomplish far more than we ever could independently.”

Member cities and Clark County share the costs of the program. Participation costs are determined through a formula that takes into account the overall population and the homeless population within each community as factors. Boulder City’s participation level is just under one percent of the overall project cost. The program costs \$839,556; Boulder City’s share of the program will be \$6716.45. The program’s operational costs did not change from 2018.

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
